It takes a bachelor's degree (4 years) and a DPT program (3 years) to become a Doctor of Physical Therapy. Some DPTs go on to do more specialized training. High School Academics

High school academics should focus on adequately preparing your student for the rigors of a science-driven undergraduate degree.

High school curriculum should expose students to **physics**, **chemistry**, **biology**, and higher order math such as **pre-calculus** or **calculus**. These courses, along with the normal complement of English, foreign language and other social studies should provide a solid foundation for the pre-medical work completed in college.

Students should take the ACT and SAT standardized assessments for college admission

Undergraduate Academics

All physical therapy schools require a bachelor's degree which includes the fulfillment of certain prerequisite courses. These courses include:

- General Chemistry I & II
- Biology I & II
- Physics I & II
- Anatomy and Physiology I & II
- English I & II
- Social Sciences (2 semesters)
- Statistics

These courses should be completed prior to the senior year of college, regardless of your major, for application purposes. The GRE is a standardized test required for entrance into graduate school. The GRE sections are Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning and Analytical Writing

Extracurricular Activities

We all depict a unique story defined by our passions and pursuits. DPT school admission committees search for well-rounded students with personal interests cultivated outside of the school environment. We admonish students to seek out their own personal interests and, if possible, take on a leadership role in that area.

Outside of personal interests, students should consider becoming involved in one or more of the following activities: prior to applying to medical school:
