Established in 2002, the Gold Humanism Honor Society (GHHS) is an international association of individuals and medical school chapters whose members are selected as exemplars of empathy, compassion, altruism, integrity, and service in their relationships with patients and others in the field of medicine. The University of Tennessee Gold Humanism Honor Society Chapter was approved in March 2009 and the first inductees were named on April 16, 2009. Our GHHS Chapter was made possible by an initial grant from the Arnold P. Gold Foundation, led by Drs. Owen Phillips, Associate Dean, UT College of Medicine (Memphis), and Mukta Panda, now Assistant Dean for Medical Student Education (Chattanooga).
